What is the most important role of citizenship in our democracy?

Students will pursue a deeper understanding of the institutions of American Government and our role in the globalized economy. The course includes a study of the Constitution, the legislative process, how the economy works, monetary and fiscal policy, and much more.

To help each student assume this responsibility, we will examine a yearlong essential question representing the culmination of civic literacy as students prepare to vote, participate in community activities, participate in the marketplace, and assume the responsibilities of citizenship. The course essential question is: What is the most role of citizenship in our democracy?

PBL Curriculum Approach

The course goal is to answer the essential question. Students will participate in civic, economic and community related activities with the intent of providing them a foundation and possible answers to the essential question. The course is divided into five challenges to facilitate this.

The five challenges are:

Challenge 1: To preserve freedom and encourage responsible citizens

Challenge 2: To foster active participation and to deliberate with others

Challenge 3: To foster the flow of useful and timely information

Challenge 4: To make hard choices and find common ground

Challenge 5: Course Final

At the conclusion of each challenge, students will participate in a debrief process called the "Pentagon." The debrief process includes

- (1) Positive Statement
- (2) Critical Thinking Questions
- (3) What worked
- (4) What didn't work
- (5) Finding value
